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Sports Premium Funding

What is Sports Premium Funding?

The premium is to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils, to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles. This funding, provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, will be allocated to primary school head teachers. The funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on the provision of PE and sport in schools.

We received 2016-2017- £8,715, 2017-2018- £16,000, 2018-2019-£16,000

Purpose of Funding

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding might include:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE
- Supporting and engaging the least active children through new and additional clubs
- Paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport
- Running sports competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in the School Games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE and sport
- Providing places for pupils on after school sports clubs and holiday clubs
- Pooling the additional funding with that of other local schools

Accountability

From September 2013, schools have had to publish details of how it spends this funding and the effect it has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment.

Children will not be charged for transport or competition entries.</p> <p>This cost is higher than last year as the school is using two competition providers and we are therefore entering more competitions.</p>	<p>£7000</p>	<p>-Continue to participate in competition finals at Thirsk High School to increase participation and competitiveness further.</p> <p>-Extend competitive opportunities by joining the Sporting influence cluster competitions. This will allow mass participation, opening opportunities for lots of children in KS1 and KS2. Sporting influence also organise sporting competitions for reception which will allow opportunities for our Early Years children to compete.</p> <p>-Continue to participate in sporting competitions through sporting start to allow children to participate in a range of different sports.</p>

This academic year we are using two providers for sporting competitions to give children wider opportunities. I ensure that every child has 2 compulsory PE sessions a week. In addition to this reception, year's 1, 2 and 3 do a daily morning run.
